Section I : Maritime General Guidelines and Registration

Unless stated here, the ACE Maritime Regional Student Convention adheres to all general rules and regulations of the ACE International Student Convention. Junior event guidelines are in this document (except follow ISC guidelines for photography). All Senior events will follow the ISC guidelines with only a few minor adjustments that are mentioned in this document. You can find ISC guidelines at: <https://aceschooloftomorrow.com/convention>

Eligibility:

Students who are at least 13 and not yet 20 by March 1 prior to Convention are Seniors.

Students under 13 who are 7 yrs of age by December 31 prior to Convention are Juniors.

Note that International Guidelines state that "Homeschool students from different homeschools may combine for group events, provided they register as a single school, and must adhere to the same event limitations as a day school." This applies to the Maritime Regional Student Convention as well.

Homeschool students must be using at least two core subjects from the A.C.E. program

PLEASE NOTE: ANY SCHOOL ATTENDING CONVENTION SHALL ARRIVE ON TIME AND MUST REMAIN FOR, AND PARTICIPATE IN, THE ENTIRE CONVENTION, INCLUDING ALL RALLIES AND THE AWARDS CEREMONY.

Events:

Some official ACE events are not offered at this Convention due to limited facilities and/or weather conditions. Please check the information sheet for the current year or check with the Convention coordinator for an up-to-date list. Events not always offered include: high jump, running long jump, basketball, tennis, table tennis, volleyball.

There will be various open events offered that do not require registration. An advance list may be released before convention; however, most open events will be offered on a "show up and play" basis. No advance preparation or registration for these open events is required.

Juniors:

Juniors (7-12 yrs) are judged separately from Seniors. (exception: Juniors joining Seniors to enter a team event that is not offered for Juniors {Color Guard, Flags Corps, etc.} will be judged with Seniors. In cases like this, please enter them in the Senior event.) Check with the convention coordinator if you have questions.

Number of Events:

As listed in official A.C.E. guidelines for age 13 and up students. (link above)

For quick reference:

For Individuals:

1. A student may enter a maximum of 8 performance events.
2. A student may enter a maximum of 3 elimination events.
3. A student may enter a maximum of 4 athletic events.
4. A student entered in athletic events must also enter a minimum of 2 non-athletic events.
5. A student may not enter 2 identical events. (not 2 Male Duets)
6. A student may enter a maximum of 12 events. (Note: CAP is not included in this as all students who qualify are entered in it automatically.)
7. Take note of additional guidelines that may apply if attending ISC.

For Schools:

1. In events involving more than four students, or in a group elimination event such as PACE Bowl, Basketball, and Volleyball, the limit is one entry per event per school. (MRSC Note: a second entry may be permissible if one team is going to ISC and the other team is not OR one team is all Seniors and the other team is all Juniors. Please contact the convention coordinator if this applies to your school.)
2. In other elimination events (Checkers, Chess, etc.) a school is allowed three entries per event.
3. In One-Act Play, Radio Program, Scripture Video, and Bible Bowl, a school is allowed three entries.
4. There can be an unlimited number of entries in Scribe and Golden Crabapple events. (This also applies to the similarly named Senior events.)
5. In all other events, a school is allowed six entries per event.

Dress Code:

As listed in International guidelines except:

Female students in athletic events may wear culottes or sweat pants, track suits, etc. which meet the same guidelines given to males.

Female students may wear socks, tights, or pantyhose.

Male students may wear polo shirts in place of button front dress shirts.

Sneakers/running shoes are permitted for many events; however, dress shoes or casual shoes are required for platform events and the awards ceremony.

To Prepare:

1. Review the List of events for Juniors (JRCF13) and/or Seniors (CF13) and decide what interests you.
2. Download Junior guidelines (part of this manual) from www.acecanada.net and the Senior guidelines (ISC) <https://aceschooloftomorrow.com/convention>. This is where you find rules and forms that you'll need to print. (Senior event forms will print automatically. Junior forms need to be printed from this manual.)
3. Decide what events you will enter, and note the requirements for each.
4. Check the guidelines and judge's forms to determine paperwork and guidelines. Note that Junior and Senior events differ.
5. Prepare your entry.
6. Register for convention.
7. Ensure you have required paperwork. (judges' forms, patterns, etc.)
8. Come to Convention.
9. Have fun!

Registration:

Same procedure for Juniors and Seniors – Online: <https://aceschooloftomorrow.com/convention>

Choose this year's convention mentioned on the Maritime information sheet. Be sure to choose Junior events which appear as 800 or 900-numbered events or 4-digit events at the end when registering a Junior student. When a Junior student enters an event team with a Senior student (female du.et, social studies project, etc.) please register the Junior student in the Senior Category.

Please send the Notice of Intent JR100 and any Judges Volunteer forms JR101 with your early registration. It can be mailed or attached to an e-mail as a photo or scanned document. This helps the host school with planning. These documents can be found in this manual.

Please bring to convention: Screening Form CF16, Sponsor Registration Forms, CF5, and Permission to Attend Forms CF6. These can be printed from the online program.

Schools are responsible for their own Health Forms CF8 and are not required to turn them in at convention.

Event Paperwork:

2 copies Judge's forms (for both Juniors and Seniors) and Creative Affidavits (where applicable) are required. Juniors, please use the Junior Form number indicated on the "Junior Student Convention Event List – Maritimes" (JRCF13). Seniors, please use the forms from ISC guidelines/that you can print automatically from the registration program.

Where applicable, patterns must be submitted. (This includes Needle/Thread, Woodworking, etc. - see guidelines.)

For Juniors: words only are required for Vocal Music performances.

For Seniors: sheet music is required for all Vocal Music performances.

Where applicable, 3 x 5 cards are to be attached to entries. (see guidelines.)

Photos for platform events and/or Needle/Thread entries are NOT required at Regionals, Plastic folders/bags are NOT required for paperwork at Regional convention.

Awards:

Recognition for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places. (possibly: buttons, ribbons, etc.)

Others determined by convention coordinator. (example: Friendship trophy, plaque, etc.)

Sponsors/Staff:

We will need help from the staff or sponsors in the area of judging, so please come prepared to help. Staff and sponsors that complete the Judges' Application (JR101) and return it by the early deadline, may have the sponsor/guest fee waived.

Section II : Junior Academics

802 Junior Bible Memory

There are 5 lists of Scriptures to memorize. They are found in Section VIII in this manual. Choose the correct list based on the year the convention is held.

The contest will be conducted in writing/printing. Contestants will be asked the six types of questions:

1. Complete the Verse – the contestant will be given a reference and part of the verse and will be expected to complete it.
2. Give the Reference – a verse will be quoted, and the contestant will be expected to give the book, chapter, and verse.
3. Category Verses – the contestant will be asked to quote a verse from a specific category (e.g. Salvation, Prayer, Soul-winning, etc.)
4. Correct – Incorrect – a reference and the verse will be read. The contestant will be expected to respond “correct” or “incorrect.” Incorrect verses will contain an obvious mistake.
5. Correct the Verse – the contestant will be given an incorrect verse, which he will be expected to correct.;
6. Quote – the contestant is given a reference and will be expected to quote the verse.

The King James Version only will be used. No penalty for punctuation errors. When a response requires a specific verse, the verse must be word for word.

805 Spelling

Each contestant is given a piece of paper and is assigned a place to write. Contestants provide their own pencils. The judge will pronounce each word twice and use it in a sentence. Contestants will then write the word. All words will be taken from the list given in this manual.

807 Checkers & 809 Chess

Students must enter these events by the early registration deadline. There will be a maximum of 3 Junior entries and 3 Senior entries per school

811 Science or Social Studies Exhibit (Form JR003)

Please see the ISC guidelines for details. Two students may work on each exhibit. Each student (or group of two) may only have one entry.

Science Exhibits:

1. Collection – classification and display. Examples: rocks, insects, leaves, etc. Man-made objects such as coins, stamps, arrowheads, etc. are not allowed.
2. Research – Develop a hypothesis, perform an experiment, record results, write your conclusion, and prepare a display to exhibit your work (e.g. how light helps a plant grow).

3. Engineering – Build electronic equipment, optical devices, solar energy converter, etc. using scientific principles to perform a task. Exhibit should include plans, diagrams, schematics, parts list, etc., so that another person could take your plans and duplicate your project.
4. Theoretical – An exhibit displaying a discussion of a scientific principle, concept, technique, or theory using charts, graphs, diagrams, photographs, audiovisuals, or other visual aids.

Social Studies Exhibits:

1. Collection—classification and display. Examples: coins, stamps, flags etc.
2. Research—Choose a topic that is directed to the development of a thesis or the answering of a question. Examples: My Family Tree, Corrie Ten Boom, The War of 1812, etc.

Creative Composition (Essay, Poetry, and Short Story Writing)

Themes may be evangelistic, inspirational, Biblical, Christian growth, patriotic, persuasive, or historical. Please write the THEME of the essay on the Judge's Forms where indicated. Remember: the title and the theme are different things. Contestants need two copies of the Judge's Form for Essay Writing. Please note that an adult may help with typing (if desired), spelling, and punctuation. The wording must be that of the student. Typing entries is not required.

821 Essay Writing (Form JR004) must be 200-250 words in length.

825 Poetry Writing (Form JR005) must be 8 to 20 lines.

823 Short Story Writing (Form JR006) must be 250-300 words.

831 Golden Crab-apple Award (Form JR007)

As a smaller version of the Golden Apple, the contestant should say by memory the first 10 chapters of Proverbs – word perfect. The student may be given up to three helps or prompts per chapter. This can be said, chapter by chapter, at their school to a pre-selected Staff member. Contestant will fill out and bring one Scripture Memory Affidavit.

832 Junior Scribe (Form JR031)

A student must write by hand (either cursive or manuscript) the entire book of John (King James Version.) All writing must have been completed in since the last regional student convention. You may enter this every year you are the correct age. An affidavit (Jr031) must be completed and brought to Master Control at convention.

Section III : Junior Arts/Photography

Entries must meet all A.C.E. standards as far as dress codes and suitable subject matter is concerned. All entries must be done in realistic style – no abstract or surrealism. No artwork should attempt to portray the face of Christ.

891 Lego Sculpture (Form JR017)

Exclusive to the Juniors – both male and female. Themes must be kept to either a Biblical scene or event (i.e. Daniel in the Lion's Den, Moses Parting the Red Sea, David and Goliath) and maintain a Christian perspective (please no violent themes). LEGO KITS will not be accepted in the kit format. These will be obvious by the combination or symmetry of the pieces used. Any kit found will be removed from the event and not included in the judging. Although extra items (props like plastic trees) may be added to the sculpture, only items formed using Lego will be judged. The idea of this category is to encourage CREATIVITY.

893 Woodworking Kit (Form JR029)

Exclusive to the Juniors – both male and female. This is a purchased kit or precut project (cutting is done by someone else) which focuses on assembly and finishing. One of the following is required: 1) a report telling how the project was completed OR 2) assembly instructions from the kit.

895 Scrapbooking (Form JR028)

(Female Only)

All items including photos in the entry MUST conform to A.C.E. Student Convention dress standards and guidelines. Please follow the guidelines for International Student Convention.

901 Mixed Media – Colour (Form JR008)

Picture using any medium (watercolor, oil paints, pencil crayons, etc.). Must be hand drawn and coloured by the student. Note that frames and hangers are NOT required for Juniors

903 Coloured Picture

There are 5 Coloring Pages – a different one each year for 5 years. The pictures are found online. After printing and colouring, edges of page should be trimmed, and picture should be mounted on construction paper. The pictures are found at www.sermons4kids.com. Choose the tab that says “Activities & Videos” then “Coloring Pages” and type title of the picture as indicated below in the filter.

Picture for convention years ending in 1 and 6 – Fishing for People #4

Picture for convention years ending in 2 and 7 – Parable of the Mustard Seed

Picture for convention years ending in 3 and 8 – Simeon Recognizes Jesus

Picture for convention years ending in 4 and 9 – Parable of the Bridesmaids #2

If you have a problem accessing pictures, please contact the convention coordinator. A Judge's Form is not required.

905 Sketching – B &W (Form JR009)

Drawing using pencil, pen, or charcoal. Note that frames and hangers are NOT required for Juniors.

909 Woodworking (not kit) (Form JR011)

Open to all contestants, male and female. One category comprises works done (a)with power tools or (b) by hand. Entries must be made entirely of wood, except for screws, nails, and hinges. Contestants need two copies of the Judge's Form for Art (Woodworking).

912 Clay Sculptures (Form JR011)

Open to all contestants, male and female. Any type of clay or play-dough can be used. Sculpture should be placed on a cardboard or some sort of hard, flat surface.

914 Metalworking (Form JR011)

Open to all contestants. Entries must be made of metal only. Items may be made from any type of metal. The student must use any type of power tool needed (nippers, welder, grinder, etc.) to form the entry.

Photography (Form JR016)

Please follow all the guidelines from the International Student Convention Guidelines including enlarging photo to 8"x10" size and matting.

Please follow the guidelines to determine where your photo fits.

Not all Senior categories are offered to Juniors.

A student may submit one entry per category (as long as they remain within entry limits.)

Section IV : Junior Needle & Thread (Female only)

All needle work will be judged on straight seams (sewing), zipper (sewing), evenness of stitches, neatness (front and back), level of difficulty, overall appearance, etc.

936 Needlework (Form JR014)

This includes embroidery, needlepoint, and counted cross-stitch. Although different techniques are used, all entries will be judged together in the same category. Only one entry per student. Please follow ISC guidelines. Pattern must be submitted. Frames are not required.

938 Sewing – Non-clothing (Form JR013)

Pattern must be submitted. If you do not use a pattern, please write out the steps you followed so that someone could duplicate your project.

940 Sewing - Clothing (Form JR012)

This may be any garment solely constructed by the contestant. Include such things as a skirt, blouse, dress, apron, sleepwear, pillow etc. The pattern chosen must be modest, in keeping with Christian character. Pattern must be submitted.

944 Crochet & Knitting (Form JR015)

Although different techniques are used, all entries will be judged together in the same category. Only one entry per student. Please follow ISC guidelines. The work must be completed solely by hand; no machine work will be accepted. Pattern must be submitted.

Section V : Junior Athletics

General Guidelines

Follow the guidelines for ISC – including how winners are determined in ties in field events. Follow the dress code for ISC or adjustments previously noted for RSC.

Track

Note that an official track is not usually available, and adjustments/allowances will be made as necessary. We could be running an oval in a parking lot, or a straight line on a side road. For relays, the passing zone will be clearly marked.

971 Incrediball Throw (Male only)

An Incrediball is similar in size to a softball, but softer and will not travel as far. Students who do not have one for practice would find it beneficial to practice with a softball. One practice throw will be permitted. (In the event that Incrediballs are not available, a softball will be used.)

973 Skipping Marathon (Male and Female together)

Single participants will skip in a marathon style setting until one remains. This is not a speed contest but rather a test of endurance, accuracy, and control. The skipper that lasts the longest will win. Student must provide their own skipping rope; however, some may be available to borrow if needed. In the event of many skippers, students will be dividing into heats that go for 5 minutes each. The top skippers will move to the finals.

Section VI : Junior Music

General Guidelines

Follow the guidelines for ISC. Any exceptions are noted below. The intent of music competition is to encourage students to apply their musical talents to Christian values. Competition arrangements are to be Christian or patriotic rather than secular. Classical music which conveys a Christian theme is acceptable. Jazz, rock, Christian rock, Contemporary rock, Contemporary Christian, or country music is not acceptable.

Vocal (Form JR019)

Male and female will be judged together.

Note that professional accompaniment recordings are not permitted; however, for junior competitors a live or recorded accompaniment may be one instrument of your choice (example: piano, guitar, etc.)

Juniors are not required to provide sheet music; however, two copies of the words exactly as you sing them are required for vocal music.

982 Vocal Solo (Form JR019)

Instrumental JR020

Male and female will be judged together.

Two copies of sheet music are required for instrumental music.

The music does NOT need to be memorized; however, extra points may be earned if it memorized.

991 Piano Solo (Form JR021)

998 Instrumental Trio or Quartet (Form JR020)

1011 Instrumental Ensemble (Form JR020)

Instrumental Ensemble – 5 or more contestants with instruments – all the same OR any variety. Time limit is 5 minutes. The time limit for the entire setup and performance will be twenty minutes. There may be an adult directing. A piano played by a contestant may be one of the instruments of the ensemble OR piano accompaniment is permitted (non-contestant) and will not count as one of the instruments. If piano is accompaniment only, please note such on the Judge's Form. Contestants may use musical scores. Percussion is permitted.

Section VII : Junior Platform (Speech/Drama)

Male and female will be judged together.

Contestants in platform events must be suitably dressed; sports jackets are not necessary, but they do add a touch of class in the overall appearance. Any costumes used must meet A.C.E. standards and be approved of prior to the performance. Remember, poise, self-confidence, eye contact, and delivery are very important in platform performances. Each platform performance must have two copies of the piece for the judges.

999 One-Act Play (Form JR026)

Remember space is limited so please choose your props and scenery accordingly. No scenery is necessary. Contestants must present an original play (written by students and/or sponsor) or an adaptation of a play (having given proper credit to the original author). Time limit is 3-5 minutes. Contents of the play should have a Biblical theme or have an appropriate moral or Christian application.

1001 Poetry Recitation (Form JR024)

The participant chooses a poem to recite by memory, using all the skills of a good dramatic presentation. It must be Biblical or Christian heritage or high moral content. No costumes, props, or singing allowed. Time limit is one to three minutes.

1003 Expressive Bible Reading (Form JR023)

Expressive reading is a selected passage from the Bible, chosen and rehearsed (does not need to be memorized), as it is to "read" before an audience. The emphasis will be on voice control, reading, pronunciation, enunciation, expression, and confidence before a large group. The audience must be acknowledged throughout the passage by eye contact and smiles. The passage must be a minimum of 12 verses and a maximum of 20. Time limit is one to three minutes.

1009 Monologue or Solo Storytelling (Form JR027)

Time limit is one to three minutes. One person per entry. Script must be memorized.

Monologue – One participant characterizes an individual, expressing that individual's thoughts, emotions, and reactions in a particular set of circumstances or events relevant to that individual. This presentation must be in the first person and can be from a selected work or written by the student or supervisor. The intent is to convey dramatic skills in which training in acting and voice are displayed. Christian or historical emphasis is a must and costumes and hand props or a single piece of furniture may be used.

Please, no scenery.

Solo Storytelling – One participant tells a story from memory. The script must flow like a story – beginning, plot, climax, and conclusion. It must also have an appropriate moral or Christian application. The storyteller may use such items as flannel graph, visual aid, costume, sound effects, accompaniment, or "props" that enhance story material.

1005 Dialogue or Two Person Storytelling (Form JR027)

Time limit is a maximum of 5 minutes. Two people per entry. Follow the guidelines for event 1009 except:

Dialogue – Two people have a conversation. Memorized.

Storytelling – Two people tell a story from memory.

1007 Puppets (Form JR025)

All scripts must be memorized in order that participants can concentrate on general movements rather than reading a script under poor conditions at best. Puppet scripts should have a Biblical theme or an appropriate moral or Christian application. Scripts must be tastefully presented, avoiding slang insinuation or questionable language or references to television and worldly practices such as movies, dancing, or mixed swimming. Participants must provide puppet theatres. Arrangements can be made to use or borrow other school's theatres, but the use of stationary barricades such as pianos or chairs will not be accepted. Time limit is up to 5 minutes. Only two participants per entry. Contestants need two copies of the Judge's Form for Puppets.

1010 Group Bible Speaking JR030

This Group Bible speaking is an interpretation by a spoken choral group of 5-30 contestants on a Bible passage of your choice. One Junior entry is allowed per school. The group will create an atmosphere by using tone of voice, inflections, pause, gesture and movement (utilizing the space available). No costumes, props, or singing allowed. The passage must be memorized. The majority of the passage is spoken chorally, but lines may be spoken by a section of the group or by solo voices. Sound effects created on stage by the contestants may be added. Presentation time limit is 2 minutes minimum to five minutes maximum. A .5-point deduction for any portion of thirty (30) second increments outside the allotted time. Any version may be used. Please provide 2 copies of the passage from the version you use.
